## How tos of Eid Day

The first day of the Islamic lunar month Shawwaal is the Eid ul-Fitr day marking a day of celebration and thanks for Allah, our Creator and Cherisher. Ramadan ends here. Here is what the Prophet used to do on the day of Eid (Sunnah) - May Allah's peace and blessings be upon him.

1. To rise early in the morning.
2. Take a full bath.
3. Clean the teeth.
4. Wear the best cloths that he had.
5. Wear perfume.
6. To eat something sweet like dates before leaving home.
7. Go to the Eid Prayers location very early. (The Prophet used to offer Eid Prayers in the central location, that is not to offer it in a Masjid of a locality without any legitimate excuse.)
8. The Prophet used to go to the Eid Prayers location by one route and will return through another route.
9. He used to go for Eid Prayers by walking to the Eid Prayers location.
10. He used to chant slowly on the way to the Eid Prayers location the following words: "Allahu Akbar, Allahu Akbar, Laailaaha Illallahu Wallahu Akbar, Allahu Akbar, Wa Lillahil Hamd." (Translation: Allah is The Greatest, He is The Greatest. There is no God except Allah. He is The Greatest. All praises and thanks are for Him.)
11. The Prophet used to give Zakatul Fitr before the Eid day. But if you have not done so far, please give now before the Eid Prayers.
12. This year in America Zakatul Fitr is calculated to be \$10 per person (\$10 for each adult and child in a family.)

## Method of Eid prayers

Eid Salat (prayers) consists of two Raka'ats in congregation of Muslims followed by the Khutba of Eid.

- Follow the Imam by raising both hands up to the ears, saying Allahu Akbar, this is the first Takbeer to enter in the Salat. After this, there will be seven more Takbeers, following the Imam by saying Allahu Akbar each time.
- After the seventh takbeer the hands should be folded in front and listen to the Imam reciting Surah Fatiha and some other short Surah and complete the first Raka'at as usual.
- In the second Raka'at, the Imam will first say Takbeer five times by saying Allahu Akbar and then recite Surah Fatiha and some other short Surah, after which the second Raka'at is completed in a usual way.
- Listening to Khutbah after the Eid Salat is Wajib and is considered part of the Salat Eidul Fitr.

## Ramadan's Special Charity - Zakat-al-Fitr

*The Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings be upon him) said, "You see the believers as regards their being merciful among themselves and showing love among themselves and being kind, resembling one body, so that, if any part of the body is not well, then the whole body shares the sleeplessness (insomnia) and fever with it." (Reported by Al-Bukhari)*

The word "zakah" in Arabic means purification. The giving of zakah (obligatory charity) is the third pillar of Islam. There are two types of zakah: zakat *al-mal* (charity paid on one's wealth) and zakat *al-fitr* (charity paid before breaking the fast of Ramadan).

Every free Muslim who owns a *saa`* (2.176 kilograms or 4.797 pounds) of dates or barley that is not needed as a basic food for himself or his family is required to pay zakat *al-fitr* at the end of Ramadan and before the `Eid Prayers. Every free Muslim must pay zakat *al-fitr* for himself, his wife, children and servants.

The Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) enjoined zakah on those who fast to purify them from any indecent act or deeds. It is a sort of purification of the soul on the individual level, a cure against miserliness, and a social safety net. The rich are obliged to come in contact with the poor and the poor with the even less fortunate.

This contact between the various levels of society helps to create a real bond of brotherhood in the Muslim community. Zakah provides for the poor and spares them the humiliation of asking for charity. The Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him) said, "Fulfill their need on this day" (that is, on the day of `Eid.)

Zakat *al-fitr* is obligatory on every Muslim, rich or poor alike, young and old, because every Muslim needs this purification. The head of the household must pay for every member of the family, even for the newborn.

This concept of charity and generosity is central to the message of Islam. In the Qur'an, the believers are described as what means [...those who spend (of that which Allah hath given them) in ease and in adversity] (Aal `Imran3:134)

**Talk it out with everyone**

Make a specific Eid plan TODAY. Sit with the family and discuss what you will do on Eid day. Plan things step-by-step. Where will you go to perform Eid prayers? Where will you go afterwards? Will you first go to the local farm to sacrifice an animal (Eidul Adha)? Get everyone involved and listen to all suggestions.

**Dress for success**

In most Muslim countries Eid is a time for buying new clothing. Since winter is coming up, it's time to exchange lighter clothing with heavy winter clothing. Shop for Eid clothes and some new items as well.

**"Allahu Akbar, Allahu Akbar...."**

Involve the kids, especially the younger ones, in loud Takbirat while going and returning from the Eid Prayers.

**Cool gift ideas**

Give gifts on this day. You can write an Eid card to your parents and friends. Check out this page for more Eid gift ideas.

**For the family's study circle**

For the collective family study circle, get a good book about the life of the Prophet and find out how the Muslims of his time celebrated Eid.

**Share Eid with the family and neighbors**

Have two Eid dinners: one for the family on Eid day and one with friends. Or maybe you just want to share some dishes on Eid with your friends.

**Take the car out for a...**

Take a family trip to some place of enjoyment. Eat and stop in between for prayers. Make this the family's first long drive after summer.

**Make your Eid one with real entertainment**

**Get everyone involved in a school presentation on aspects of Eid**

The whole family can get involved in preparing a school presentation about Eid, especially since Christmas is coming up. Kids can see their Muslim classmates celebrating too.

**Give gifts generously-give an Eidee**

In some parts of the Muslim world a small amount of money is given to children as Eidee. You can do that or give a small present. Please avoid the commercialism (and please check out one perspective on why Eid gifts are better than Eidees.)

**Decorate the home for Eid**

There's nothing wrong with decorating the home for Eid. It will help liven up the atmosphere. Use balloons, banners, streamers, lights, and more.

**Start a family project**

Why not mark Eid-ul-Fitr with a new family project? For example, start of a family library. Discuss the issue practically: how many books, which kinds, budget, where will the library be set up in the home, etc.

**Share with needy kids**

During Eid-ul-Fitr, children in need must be remembered by sharing something with them. Encourage a family donation from each member for needy children in a specific part of the world.

**Encourage the kids to make handmade gifts**

Why not help children make gifts for one another? Not only is this inexpensive, handmade gifts tend to come from the heart, more than the wallet.

**Discuss the Eid day menu**

If you are the family member responsible for preparing the food on Eid day, consult other members of the family. Consultation may help you involve them in preparation and cleanup as well.

**Hug your brother, hug your sister**

At the place where Eid prayer is held, a lot of hugging goes. You will find some Muslims standing alone. They are either new Muslims or new immigrants without relatives and friends. Do hug them and greet them. If possible invite them to your home for a meal. Also inform them of any planned Eid celebrations at any community center. Have a great Eid everyone. May Allah bless you with more and the best of this world and the real best in the everlasting life.

IAH follows the Course of Study established by the State of Alabama based on national education standards and uses the Common Test of Basic Skills (CTBS), a nationally-recognized standardized testing instrument, to measure the academic achievement of students, grades 1-12, in Language Arts, Spelling, Math, Science, Social Studies, and Reference Skills. IAH students earned an overall score in the 80<sup>th</sup> percentile in Reading, Language, and Math in 2008.

Currently, there are 57 students at IAH and 11 highly qualified and experienced teachers. IAH believes that all children should have an opportunity to mature to their fullest potential in an Islamic environment that promotes high academic achievement, multicultural respect, and moral excellence based upon the guidance of the Quran and Sunnah.
